

## **Gary Heath (1-38) – Statement May 15, 1991**

Gary Heath was known to dodge the justice system by making deals in exchange for help with his own criminal cases, including murder. That didn't change for some years, because David Lindloff and other Preble County Officials made sure of it. His testimony provided the prosecution what they needed to indict Billy for Lesa's murder. When his demands were not met in a timely manner he wrote threatening letters which reference his intentions to expose the deal that had been made. We have letters that substantiate our claims that the promises made to Heath by Lindloff were kept. Gary Heath has since admitted his testimony was false and was provided to him by David Lindloff. We have a video taped statement of Gary's recantation which does include him being sworn in under oath.

After being released early, as promised, Gary remarried and then shot his wife in the head.

STATEMENT OF GARY HEATH

1 - 38

DL: Okay, Today's date is May 15, 1991 the time is 15 minutes after 2:00. We're in the interview room at the Preble County Sheriff's Department. Present during this interview is Gary Heath and Investigator David Lindloff with the Preble County Prosecutor's Office. Okay first, Gary, I want to read you something here then we'll go through a series of questions. I going to read you your *Miyanda* warning. You have the right to remain silent, anything you say can and will be used against you in a Court of Law. You have a right to talk to a lawyer and have him present with you while your being questioned. If you cannot afford to hire a lawyer, one will be appointed to represent you before any questioning if you wish. You can decide at any time to exercise these rights and not answer any questions or not make any statements. Okay, Gary do you understand each of the rights that I have explained to you?

GH: Yes, sir.

DL: Having these rights in mind is there something that you would like to talk to me about?

GH: Yes, sir.

DL: Okay, once again what's today's date Gary?

GH: May 15, 1991.

DL: Okay, and did you just go for an arraignment in the Common Pleas Court?

GH: Yes, sir.

DL: And you know me from a previous encounter right?

GH: Yes, sir. A previous encounter.

DL: And at some point did you call me up to the table and ask me something?

GH: Yes, sir. I asked you if we could talk.

DL: Okay, then after the hearing I sat down and talked with you about something and uh, we come back up to the Preble County Jail and we're here talking about it right now, is that correct?

GH: Yes, sir.

DL: Okay, first of all give me your full name, Gary.

GH: Gary Steven Heath.

DL: Your date of birth and social security number.

GH: September 6, 1959. ~~XXXXXXXXXX~~

DL: Okay, your address.

GH: None, at the present time.

DL: Okay, where was you living when they picked you up last night?

GH: Uh, I was staying at the Country Club Motel in Hamilton, Ohio.

DL: You been there about 4 days?

GH: Yes sir.

DL: Okay and uh, concerning these events that we're going to talk about it's a criminal activity that took place in Mason, Ohio?

GH: Yes, in 1985.

DL: In 1985.

GH: October 22, 1985.

DL: October 22, 1985.

GH: I remember that day very well, the worst day of my life.

DL: Okay, let's go, first of all since I know nothing about it in your own words you, in your own words explain what happened on or about that date, October 22, 1985 in Mason, Ohio.

GH: I, uh, was having a relationship with a lady, uh, we were into the drug scene uh, you want the whole what happened?

DL: Yeah, go ahead in your own words then I'll go back and ask you questions.

GH: We had been involved in a selling cocaine to make money um, I had used previous connections in my past, uh, had introduced this girl to uh, the product the money that could be made from selling it uh, the feeling that you get from doing it. Uh, I had introduced her to some people, uh, involved in the trading and selling and the distribution of cocaine. Uh, alot of them were musicians uh, she got to know them rather well, uh, we, we formed like a partnership to where we could get the drugs fronted to us for X amount of days for X amount of dollars. Uh, we had gotten cocaine fronted to us uh, when it came time for them to collect the money uh, she didn't have any money, uh, the cocaine had went up in parties and free gifts and up our noses and our arms and uh, they commenced to beat the hell out of her.

DL: And what was the girls name Gary?

GH: Vendetta Cox, uh V-e-n-d-e-t-t-a, she was known as Vende for short.

DL: And who was the two subjects that beat her up?

GH: Uh, Rob Reed and uh, Don Kaluchi.

DL: Where is Rob Reed and Don Kaluchi from?

GH: Uh, Dayton, well Don Kaluchi is from Newark, New Jersey but he lives in planes, and vans and clubs down here and he lives in Dayton.

DL: Did you introduce these two guys to Vendetta?

GH: Yes.

DL: What was her nick, what did they call her?

GH: Vende.

DL: Vende?

GH: V-e-n-d-y.

DL: Okay and you introduce these two guys to Vende?

GH: Uh, my roommate at the time was a guitar player in a band and I had known him for years uh, when me and my first wife split up uh, he had a key to the apartment in Seven Hills which is just outside of Fairfield uh, he had agreed to let me share the apartment and ..

DL: What was his name Gary?

GH: Rick Bissantzant.

DL: How do you spell that?

GH: B-i-s-s-a-n-t-z-a-n-t, something like that. Uh, I shared the apartment with him uh, we split the rent um, it was a uh, a good arrangement because I worked days and he worked nights so that gave us freedom along with ladies or whatever. Uh, I was seeing Vende Cox romantically at the time uh, we started going to the clubs where Rick's band was playing and Don Kaluchi is the uh, I guess you could call it, it was his band he's the key board player he handles the bookings the money and all that kind of stuff.

DL: What was Rick's last name?

GH: Bissantzant. something like that. But automatically Don, Don Kaluchi's the type of guy that uh anything to make a buck. Uh, Vende had a job working for Ray uh, sporting goods distributor uh and they automatically hit it off because she could give him prices on T-shirts and satin jackets to have the bands logo printed on and they could sell them and make money. Uh, she uh, attended a couple of parties that we threw uh, she experimented with cocaine for the first time according to her. Uh, I have no, no reason to believe otherwise, uh, she got tight with all the guys in the band uh, you know we did a lot of things together. You know, the members of the band and their girlfriends and wives and me and Vende um, it just kept progressing to the point where we all got greedy and wanted to make money.

DL: Okay. Now did she have any type of sexual relationship with anyone else at this time, other than you?

GH: Uh, no. Not to my knowledge and I have no reason to believe that she did.

DL: And the two subjects once again that beat her up and killed her was Don Kaluchi and...

GH: Dona Kaluchi and Rob Reed.

DL: Now what type of quantity of drugs, of cocaine was they supplying you?

GH: Uh, one pound of cocaine for 30 days for \$10,000.00.

DL: Okay one pound would break down to about what, about a quarter, no..... a kilo weighs 2.2 pounds..

GH: 2.2 pounds.

DL: Okay so a pound would be what part of a kilo?

GH: A little less than 50%.

DL: Okay. And would you sell this in one lump sum or would you break this down into eight bowls or..

GH: No, we was breaking it down into grams and uh, eight balls, quarter ounces, it was, we made more money by selling it by the gram uh, and we had done it a couple of times and made out pretty good on money and then this last one uh, it got to our heads, uh, we had parties and uh, was giving grams out as they come in the door and um, was fronting people and just getting out of control.

DL: Okay. And how long did this go on before uh, Ven, Vende was killed?

GH: Uh, Uh, five or six months.

DL: Okay, and what was the procedure, once you collected the money, who did, who had to pay the money to uh, Don or Rob?

GH: Well, it, it varied. This last time the cocaine was dropped off at Vende's apartment in Mason. Uh, I was at work uh, I guess their feeling was the deal was struck with her uh, and at the end of thirty days when they come the don't, we had an understanding they don't come, they don't knock on the door and ask, when they come we automatically knew what it was for nothing had to be said you know uh, they got their money and or the quantity of cocaine that was left. That's the way they worked. Uh, when they come to collect if you only sold half of it, you only had 5 grand you had to give them 5 grand and 5 grams of cocaine back and they would

re-strike a deal again. Uh, they wanted, at the end of thirty days they wanted their money and the return on the coke and then they would deal again. They wouldn't just say well you still got that left just give us 5 grand you can owe us 5 more. They just didn't do business that way.

DL: At this present time, was you living separate from Vende?

GH: Uh, yes and no. We had been living together and our age difference was causing a little bit of a conflict uh, different as in a lot of personal things was causing a lot of conflicts and we were together we just decided that we couldn't live together um, the reason that I had originally lived with her period was because I was spending so much time with her and the drive between Mason and Seven Hills and would be working in Hamilton, it was getting to where I was spending more time on the road than at any of the other three places.

DL: How old was Vende?

GH: Uh, let's see she was thirty.. two at the time and I would have been 25. So there would have been like 6 or 7 years difference.

DL: Did she have any children?

GH: Yeah, she had a daughter Krista, that was a at the time in 1985 that was a 13, going on 14.

DL: And was she present when this happened?

GH: No. She had left for school. Her grandfather had picked her up for school.

DL: And how, how much notice, how long did she know that she owed

'these guys money for coke?

GH: Well, to be honest with you they was suppose to come the night before. Uh, but they didn't come, they came that morning. Uh, we were expecting them, I don't know the day, I know the date, but I don't know the day of the week, we we're expecting them the night before but they didn't show and they showed up the next morning. I guess it couldn't have been more than 2 or 3 minutes after her daughter had left for school. So I, I don't know if they were sitting outside waiting for her to leave or if it was just coincidence that they came immediately after.

DL: Did they know that you was in the apartment?

GH: Uh, I would imagin so, if they spotted my truck. I had a truck that was one of a kind. You couldn't have missed it.

DL: What type of vehichle was they driving that day? Don Kaluchi and Rob Reed?

GH: Uh, was driving a van I'm not sure of the make it might have been Chevy, it was sort of like customized. It's not something that you would do yourself. You buy them that way, I think they call it a conversion or something. Uh, other than that I'm not really sure on what color, the design and all that stuff was on it. Uh, the van belonged to Don Kaluchi uh, you know uh, ...

DL: Do you recall how they were dressed that day?

GH: Uh,...they wasn't dressed up, Don Kaliuchi was always (inaudible...) sort of a flashy dresser um, I've never seen him in a T-shirt, he always wears nice shirts, he's an Italian guy, um even to the necklaces and the rings and uh, he's your typical

italian guy. Dark eyes, dark hair uh as far as what exactly what they was wearing no I don't.

DL: Okay. Uh, do you remember approximately what time of day it was they came to the apartment?

GH: I would say somewhere around 8:00 a.m.

DL: And then in your words, once they got there, first of all tell me what was said and then what did they do?

GH: Um, I was, she was in the bathroom uh, curling her hair getting ready to go to work, I was dressed and ready for work I was drinking coffee, uh, knock on the door, I went to the door opened it up, it was them, uh, you know I just let them in just like always you know, uh, I kind of felt something was out of place, I hung around for a little while, they was all in the corner in the dinning room talking um, words were being exchanged. I kind of froze up, I couldn't move even when I seen what they was doing I couldn't move. I don't know if I was afraid of them or just shocked at what I was seeing for the first time in my life. I don't know it just...

DL: Was there anything said prior to them uh, killing her?

GH: Uh.....

DL: Concerning money or..

GH: Most of their talk was whispering over in the corner of the dinning room. Uh, I heard bits and pieces but as far as putting a complete sentence together um, you know uh..

DL: Okay, during this time was you also, was Vende that it was actually doing the business with Kaluchi and Reed or had you been

too?

GH: Both of us had been, but at this particular time when they dropped off the goods I was at work so they had dealt with both of us before so I guess it was comfortable for them to deal with her at this time and I guess because I wasn't there uh, I guess they assumed that it was between them and her. And uh, in a way maybe, when everything comes out in the wash maybe in a way I'm responsible for what happened to her, but not as far as actually doing it.

DL: What happened after that, after they took her in the corner and talked with her for awhile.

GH: Uh, she started to walk away uh, Rob grabbed her from the hair from behind and jerked her down to the floor and was sitting on her uh, she was I wouldn't say screaming but she was like calling out, uh, a name but it wasn't my name it was Steve or something like that, there was a guy named Steve that lived across the hall uh, he put his hand over her mouth and was choking her.

DL: Rob put his hand over her mouth?

GH: Yeah. He was choking her and uh, the whole time I was afraid I was froze, I was chilled, I was, you know it wasn't gross or nothing I was just never seen nothing like that with my own eyes before and uh, they helped her up, they went into the bedroom uh, I didn't follow them, I assumed they was going to go in there and to talk or whatever, I heard some things falling around, they didn't make a lot of noise..

DL: Okay, try to keep this in some type of order. What did Don

Kaluchi done to this point?

GH: Stood there. Mostly. Stood there.

DL: And he's kind of the boss man correct?

GH: Yeah, if I had to put one as a boss I'd say he's the boss.

DL: And uh, they actually choked her some, where did that take place?

GH: In the living room floor is where they choked her then they helped her up..

DL: When you was in the living room did they knock anything over?

GH: No. Uh, there's a the living room's quit a big living room the living room and the dinning room's kind of connected and there's a lot of distance between the coffee table and the front of the couch. And uh, the chairs in the dinning room, there'd be enough to where, it was big enough to where we wrestled there playing around before.

DL: Right. Okay, so they go into the bedroom.

GH: Uh, they help her up and they go into the bedroom and I was assuming they was going in there to finish their talk um, I hear a little commotion but I'm still a little dumb founded my first inclination was to get the hell out of there uh, I didn't I just sat there. About 10 or 15 minutes later they came out and looked at me kind of strange and just told me that they weren't going to hold me financially responsible uh, I had went into the bedroom and she was laying on the bed with a pillow across her face. And she wasn't breathing.

DL: Had they left the apartment by then?

. GH: No. They were in the living room they were talking between themselves.

DL: Okay, did you know she was dead then?

GH: No, for about 5 minutes, I got nauseated and I thought I was going to puke uh, I did step into the bathroom which is right next to the bedroom for just a minute and flashed some water into my face, I remember looking into the mirror and just looking into my own eyes and just trying to think of what kind of person I was to get involved into something like this and to let something like that happen. I went into the bedroom uh, pulled the pillow back off of her face and she didn't move and her eyes were wide open.

DL: Do you remember how she was dressed?

GH: Blue jeans, uh, some kind of a satin, silk or satin top, I guess you'd call it a blouse uh, I don't even think she had her shoes on yet. I think that was basically it, it was pretty warm outside.

DL: Okay, you still had a relationship with her correct?

GH: Right.

DL: Prior to that October 22, date when she was murdered had you had sex, when was the last time you had sex with her?

GH: Uh, not the night before but the day before that.

DL: The day before that.

GH: Right. So it would have been two days before the..

DL: Two days before the October probably October..

GH: So it would have been like the 20th. The afternoon of the 20th.

DL: Afternoon, okay. Okay, now she's dead and they told you that they didn't hold you responsible.

GH: The didn't hold me financially responsible uh, Kind of looking at me like intimidating me uh, I was uh, my mind was going in 4 or 5 different directions I didn't know what was, what should I do; should I leave, should I call the police, should I get into it with them? I start dismissing my options because number one I was only one of me to two of them. Don was known to carry a gun, I've never seen him pull it on anybody but I seen a gun on him before and I know I did see a gun on him this particular day but uh, I have a fear of guns, I don't like them, and uh, when I finally had realized what had happened I was automatically telling myself in my mind that I was as much at fault as they was I helped dispose of the body.

DL: Okay.

GH: I didn't harm the body, I didn't..

DL: Did they tell you, say don't you say a word?

GH: In some, they didn't come out and say it like that it's just they told me that whether I liked it or not I was as much to blame as they was. And uh, they were trying to figure out what to do with the body, they didn't want to leave the body there in the apartment, uh, I in a way helped dispose of the body and I didn't harm the body in anyway I didn't do anything to it uh, I just told them where the best place to dump it would be. And, with the use of my pick up truck that's what we did.

DL: Okay, where did you tell them to dispose of the body?

GH: Uh, First I told them there's like a park across the street, uh, a large park with a bunch of baseball diamonds and stuff that was originally my first idea uh, that seemed to be too close and too open, uh, we had put the body in a box, put the body in the back of my truck, they followed me down the road uh, time to pull off, we pulled off and we got out and walked back through there decided that was the best place, pushed the box off out of my truck and I left. They were still there when I left. All I did was get the box off of my truck. I didn't transport the box back to the bushes I didn't help them carry it back there I didn't help nothing.

DL: Okay, what type of truck did you have?

GH: A truck, a company truck for a guy that I worked for, and it was a 85 Chevy Luv with ladder racks on it and all that stuff.

DL: Okay, what type of, excuse me, what type of company was you working for at the time?

GH: A siding company in Hamilton.

DL: Do you know the name of it?

GH: Uh, (inaudible..) Custom Siding.

DL: Are they still in business?

GH: I imagine he is.

DL: Would you take the company truck home?

GH: Yeah. I would after work the truck was mine to uh, it was his truck but it was mine to take home uh, I took care of the truck, I did a lot of service calls after hours for him, I hauled a lot of garbage to the dump off of the job sites and stuff. It was my

truck to take home and I was responsible to take care of it and wash it and put gas in it and keep up on the maintenance and .

DL: Okay, Gary where did you get the box? Or who got the box?

GH: The box was there at the apartment, it was a box that a uh stereo system of mine had come in. A large box, the whole system had come in one box the component, the speakers, the stands everything come in one large box. Probably uh, 3 by 4 by 4 foot tall.

DL: And who put the body in the box?

GH: Uh, Rob and Don.

DL: Okay, how long after she was murdered before they put her in the box?

GH: 30 minutes.

DL: And go on and tell how did they crate it up, or how did they box it up after they put her body in it, was she still fully clothed?

GH: Yes.

DL: Same clothes as what she was murdered in?

GH: Right. They put her in the box folded the flaps over uh, rolled tape I'm not sure, and I know what kind of tape it was that gray tape, but I don't know where the tape came from. Taped it up uh, put it in the back of my truck.

DL: Who carried the box out to your truck?

GH: Uh, Rob. He didn't carry it, he kind of rolled it up the steps end over end the carton was, the apartment was, the basement was as you come in the front door there's like 5 steps down only

have the apartment was under the ground. Upper half was above.

DL: How many other apartments is in there? Is it an apartment complex?

GH: It's an apartment complex and there's probably either 6 or 8 apartments in the building.

DL: Did anybody see you guys taking the box out to the truck?

GH: No, uh, I don't think so.

DL: Okay. Uh, and you loaded it in the back of your truck.

GH: Right. and uh, drove down the road.

DL: Approximately which way, what was the name of the road?

GH: Uh, Rt. 42.

DL: Route 42 out of Mason. Which way out of..

GH: South.

DL: South out of Mason going toward Cincinnati.

GH: Going toward interstate 275.

DL: Okay interstate 275 and approximately was they in the truck with you?

GH: No they were, at one time they were in front of me then they were behind me because they weren't sure quit where the hell they was going. Uh, Uh, there's a open area open to the left I pulled off they pulled off behind me we walked back through there come back took the tailgate down pulled the box off on the ground I put the tailgate back up latched it and I headed to Hamilton to work as fast as I could.

DL: How far off was it a main, was it a dirt road you pulled on to?

GH: No. It was just a like a wider berm of the road. It was a..

DL: Did it, road have a name that you turned off of?

GH: It wasn't a turn off, it was just right off the side of 42.

DL: Oh I see.

GH: Just a like that brown area down here.

DL: Okay. On 127.

GH: Yeah, it's like that gravel area that pulled off there, it's just like one of those.

DL: Okay.

GH: And we just pulled off there. And uh, drove to work as fast as I could.

DL: Okay. Who actually shoved the box off of the truck?

GH: Uh, I guess all of us did. I was anxious to get it off there and uh, I guess all of us kind of did.

DL: Uh, and that was on October 22.

GH: Yes.

DL: How long before someone discovered the body?

GH: Days. I'm not even quit sure. 7, 8, 9 days I'm not for sure I was in jail when they finally found the body. Because I seen it on television and it really tore me up and shit.

DL: Uh, um, After and at this point, when your out there and disposing of the body, did Don Kaluchi and Rob Reed say anything to you at that time?

GH: Uh, no most of it was looks of intimidation, just looks.

DL: Okay, since then have you had any kind of, well I don't want to get ahead of the game.

DL: At some point and time 7, 8, 9 days whatever it was when the body was discovered did you know who discovered it or how it come about?

GH: Uh, just what the television said, uh, a psychic. And one of her relatives went to a psychic uh, the psychic had described the area around the body and he had went and found the body then went and got the police. I'm just going by what I saw on the television.

DL: Okay.

GH: Because I was in jail on, on the time all this came down, uh, when me and her daughter filed a police report missing person report uh, I guess my name was the first name they ran and I had a warrant on me for parole violation.

DL: Okay, when did you file the police report?

GH: Uh, the same night. Same night, late that night.

DL: On October 22.

GH: Yeah.

DL: Did you go back and talk to, what was the daughter's name?

GH: Krista.

DL: Did you go back and talk to Krista?

GH: No she had come home from school and uh, we kind of was sitting down and was worried and everything and he come and we did the report.

DL: Who took the missing person report?

GH: Uh, Mason cop, I'm not sure of his name?

DL: Did he..

GH: He was a Sergeant I believe.

DL: Did he take a clothing description?

GH: Uh, I don't know if he did or not.

DL: Okay, Then how long was it before after you made a missing person, I suppose the next chain of events was probably...

GH: The night we made out the missing person report I had left uh, I had went back to where I had been living with my wife who we, we were separated but I was going back to stay with her for awhile and uh, the next morning I got up and went to Mason and when I pulled up in the front of the apartment the cops were all over. And uh, I was immediately a suspect and the only charge they had on me was a parole violation uh, I spent about 2 months in the County and was returned to the institution.

DL: Okay, what was on the warrant.

GH: On the parole violation.

DL: Okay, did they question you concerning the death of Vende?

GH: Yes.

DL: Soon after you was arrested?

GH: Yeah, in fact when I was arrested at the apartment complex I was taken straight to the Mason Police Department and interviewed there.

DL: Who interviewed you?

GH: I don't even remember the guys name?

DL: Did he ask you questions concerning Vende's death?

GH: Yes.

DL: What, did you tell him anything different than what you've

told me?

GH: Well, basically I just left alot of it out. And I said I was scared uh.

DL: Did you tell them who killed her?

GH: No. I said I was scared I didn't say anything I was scared of retaliation.

DL: You were scared of Don and Rob?

GH: Uh, and other people even though they was the people that was there on the site there's other people involved and uh, just basically afraid of all of them and after I went to the, got sent back to the joint on a parole violation I had no contact with them uh, Mason Warren County was playing games with me, uh, parole board wouldn't give me parole uh, they would call and uh, get it taken away from me at the last day, they'd give it back to me and call and get it taken away again uh, we continued to play mind games with each other for a couple of months and finally the parole board had enough and they let me go home and I haven't had any contact with Warren County or Mason, uh, and uh, no contact with Kaluchi and Reed, uh, until I guess about 2 years ago the contact I had with then was because I was afraid for my life, uh, I was afraid to the point where I was afraid to go outside and leave and go anywhere even with my wife in the day light uh, my wife was pregnant with my son at the time and that scared me. Uh, ..

DL: That would have been Jake and your current wife.

GH: Right. Uh, I was afraid for myself and for her, and an unborn baby I had uh, contacted Captain Rick Sizemore Butler

Counties Sheriff's Department and met with him a few times, my parole officer was giving me a lot of flack.

DL: Let me ask you a question here. Have you told this story your telling me today to anyother police official. Rick Sizemore or anybody?

GH: No sir.

DL: Okay.

GH: We uh, me and my wife, she was pregnant, I got scared to the point where uh, we left town for few months, uh, we went to a friend of mine in Georgia and we went down to her relatives in Florida uh, it just got to the point where I was tired of running and looking over my shoulder and uh, we came back in time for Christmas, my parole officer then was giving me a lot of flack and he was looking for me cause we had took off and I didn't want to tell him what was going on because he wasn't the type of person to understand what I was feeling and all that and uh, I got sent back to the joint again. Uh, they sent me back and reinstated my parole and kicked me back out, you know when, I got out the last time I kind of felt relieved because that would have been two times that I had been under pressure of the system and I hadn't cracked yet. And I was hoping that would prove somthing to the (inaudible..) and uh, I never have, I didn't have any contact with them uh, from that time on from uh, June of 89 was when I got out of my parole violation uh, I got out in June of 89 my son was 6 weeks old, uh, me and my wife was still together and I didn't have any contact with them again until I looked them about a month ago, month and

a half ago.

DL: Okay, on a back to Vende, what at approximately what time did you arrive at the house that morning? Her apartment excuse me.

GH: The day that they arrested me?

DL: The, the day that she was murdered.

GH: In the morning that she was murdered?

DL: Yes.

GH: I had spent the night there.

DL: You had spent the night there.

GH: Right.

DL: And Vende, excuse me her daughter was also there that night?

GH: Yes.

DL: Her daughter has a separate bedroom?

GH: Yes.

DL: Did you sleep in the same room with Vende?
